Design a set of <u>2</u> postcards from the trip illustrating and explaining what you and your family would do on this vacation.	Write an alternate ending for your book. Think about what details you would want to change, and what details you might want to keep the same. You can rewrite the ending of the story starting at any point in the story. Include vivid verbs and sensory language. Try to make the ending as creative as possible.	If you were able to meet one of the characters in your book, whom would you choose and what would you talk about? What questions would you have? Write out interview questions you would ask them and possible responses based on what you learned about the character. (Include at least 7 questions.)
